GUFC's Announces Second Year of Tree Legacy Grant Program, with funding from the Home Depot Foundation

The Georgia Urban Forest Council is proud to announce the **2008-2009 Tree Legacy Grant Program**, which is generously funded by the Home Depot Foundation. The purpose of this grant program is to provide funding to Georgia communities for urban forestry projects involving tree planting to achieve environmental goals. This funding program will allow communities to take a "big picture" approach to their urban forest, growing the forest in places that will help mitigate the environmental impacts of stormwater, air pollution, impervious surfaces and other issues, creating healthier and better managed urban forests.



In order to maximize the impact of the grant dollars and create model projects across the state, GUFC is targeting a different region of the state each year. Last year, The City of Pelham, The City of Americus, Trees Columbus, and The City of Tifton in southwest Georgia received a total of \$50,000 in funding to help replant this storm-damaged area and improve its existing urban forest. The 2008-2009 Tree Legacy Grant Program will provide grant assistance to communities in Metro Atlanta. For this year's grant cycle, communities in the following fourteen Metro Atlanta counties are eligible to apply: **Cherokee, Clayton, Cobb, Coweta, Dekalb, Douglas, Fayette, Forsyth, Fulton, Gwinnett, Hall, Henry, Paulding, and Rockdale.** A study conducted between 1991 and 2005 by the Natural Resources Spatial Analysis Laboratory (NARSAL) at the University of Georgia revealed that this area of metro Atlanta lost approximately 50 acres of tree canopy per day which was replaced by impervious surface at a 1:1 ratio, making this region an ideal candidate for the Tree Legacy Grant Program. Upon completion, projects will be showcased on the GUFC's web site to demonstrate results of increased tree canopy.

The Tree Legacy Grant Program addresses two vital areas of The Five-Year Plan for Georgia's Urban and Community Forest, 2007-2011. These areas include (1) increasing tree canopy and limiting impervious surface, and (2) increasing the understanding of the resource value of trees for residents, elected officials and resource managers. The objective met will be an increase in the benefits provided by adequate and healthy tree canopy such as cleaner air and water, health benefits for citizens, and greater habitat for wildlife. These grants will bring attention to the urban forest and will ultimately create sample projects in every corner of the state allowing communities to see via their neighbors what can be accomplished. In addition to the environmental benefits reaped by participating communities, raising the profile of urban forestry and concretely demonstrating its benefits encourages all communities to manage their urban forest resources responsibly.

Eligibility

Only urban forestry projects involving strategic planting/management to mitigate environmental impacts will be considered. Only registered nonprofits and local governments may apply. Partnerships are encouraged, as are regional and multi-jurisdictional proposals. **Funds are not available for beautification projects.**

Available Funds: \$50,000

Maximum Award: \$20,000

Grant awards must be matched dollar-for-dollar with cash or in-kind services.

Grant Application Deadline: **December 1, 2008**

Grant Recipients announced: **December 31, 2008**

Projects may start **January, 2009** and must be completed by **December 31, 2009.**

The City of Dalton to present Liberty Tree Celebration in October

The City of Dalton, which planted a Liberty Tree at City Hall in the Fall of 2006, will be presenting a four-day **“Liberty Tree Celebration”** **October 16-19.**

Original Liberty Trees were used as meeting points for the Sons of Liberty revolutionaries who were working for independence from England. The Dalton Liberty Tree is a tulip poplar grown from the seeds of an original Liberty Tree that grew on the St. John's college campus in Annapolis, Maryland. This original tree was cut down in 1999 after it sustained damage from Hurricane Floyd. American Forests took the seeds and gave them to Providence Forum who grew the seedlings and gave them to each state that was one of the original thirteen colonies. Dalton was chosen to receive its Liberty Tree because of the outstanding work of its Tree Board, its dedication to maintenance and its accomplishments in urban forestry. Dalton's Liberty Tree was recently named to Georgia Urban Forest Council's Landmark & Historic Tree Register.

Dalton's Liberty Tree Celebration will include speakers from local government on Thursday, October 16; speakers from the Providence Forum and American Forests on Friday, October 17; a family celebration at Dalton Green Park with living history re-enactors, historic speeches from the Revolutionary period, music from the 8th Infantry Regimental Band, and an 8:45 p.m. fireworks show on Saturday, October 18; and an ecumenical picnic on Sunday, October 19.
