In September, Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack announced an additional \$89.3 million of Forest Service projects to be funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The Sustainable Community Forestry Program of the Georgia Forestry Commission received \$897,000 for the **Community Tree Planting for Ecosystem Restoration and Green Jobs: Georgia's Growing Green Project**. The funding will be used to restore ecological health by planting and caring for trees in watersheds, stream banks, parking lots, streets, housing developments, brownfields, and schools, primarily in communities across north Georgia where the highest net changes in unemployment rates exist. Georgia Forestry Commission Named Number One In Customer Service For Georgia

The Georgia Forestry Commission has been named the “Customer Service Agency of the Year” by Governor Sonny Perdue. In addition, McDuffie / Warren Chief Ranger Hal Sharpe won in the category of “Individual Excellence” and The Jasper / Jones Unit was a finalist in the “Team of the Year” category, at the Third Annual Governor’s Customer Service Awards ceremony in Atlanta on September 28, 2009.

With 123 state organizations employing some 130,000 public servants, the awards committee (comprised of many executives from leading businesses in the private sector) combed through well over 500 nominations from 42 different agencies across Georgia. Nominees demonstrate “above and beyond” service that is helpful, courteous, and knowledgeable.

In considering the GFC nomination for Agency of the Year, judges learned about GFC’s Moving Forward meetings, which brought employees together to brainstorm ideas about cutting costs and raising revenues while providing outstanding customer service. Several complimentary letters from customers enhanced the GFC nomination package. The nomination for Hal Sharpe’s Individual Customer Service honor highlighted his outstanding service in the areas of fire prevention, community education, process improvements and cost savings. The five-person Jasper/Jones Unit, which includes Howell Crutchfield, Randall Frazier, Tommy Williams, Chris Buchanan, and Joshua Howell, was a finalist for the Team Excellence Customer Service award. The Unit was recognized in nomination documents for its reduction of wildfires and increases in pre-suppression firebreaks and number of customers served.

► Outstanding Urban Arboriculture:

Spence Rosenfeld and Arboguard Tree Specialists for Tree Preservation at the Atlanta Botanical Garden's Southern Seasons Garden

When constructing their Southern Seasons Garden, The [Atlanta Botanical Garden](#) wanted to create a memorable woodland experience for visitors and asked Spence Rosenfeld and his arborists at Arboguard Tree Specialists to protect and preserve the trees. Some of the innovative methods that Arboguard used to protect trees during construction included using an air spade to expose tree roots greater than 1" in order to avoid damage; moving walkways, irrigation and walls around the roots that would have been damaged; constructing "bridges" for the path to keep it above roots that would have been disturbed and/or cut; using materials such as Geo-textiles and Stalite Permatile to protect against construction impact; and using organic soil amendments to restore and fortify root systems. The Garden opened to the public in 2009 and visitors now enjoy beautiful woodland plants happily thriving under healthy oaks, tulip poplars and beeches.

► Outstanding Individual Achievement:

Larry Morris is the Associate Chief of the Sustainable Community Forestry Program of the Georgia Forestry Commission (GFC). Since the retirement of Sharon Dolliver in October, 2008, Larry has also been serving as the Interim Communications Chief of the Communications Department. Larry has always been a steadfast supporter of the Georgia Urban Forest Council and the GFC urban forestry program since he was a Georgia Forestry Commission District Forester. Under Larry's leadership, the Atlanta District of GFC was District of the Year in 1995 and was a model program for

states across the South and the Nation. When GFC reorganized and Larry moved to the Athens District, Athens was District of the Year for two consecutive years, 2002 and 2003. Because of his leadership and experience, Larry was appointed Associate Chief of the Sustainable Community Forestry Program (SCFP) in 2005 by GFC Director Ken Stewart. Several new programs were initiated by SCFP with Larry at the helm including *Making the Shade* and the statewide *Tree Canopy and Impervious Surface Study*. To bring in more support for *Making the Shade*, Larry established SCFP's first corporate partnership and sponsorship of this new program with Milliken. In 2008, Larry managed a \$75,000 grant from the US Forest Service, funding used for market research of consumer interest in urban forestry and completed in partnership with the Georgia Urban Forest Council and Revolution Partners. This grant, and the research itself, have had a great impact on the urban forestry program and have created a long-lasting legacy for the state of Georgia.

► Outstanding Business:

The Rome Braves for Home Runs for a Greener Rome



For the 2009 season, the Rome Braves, along with community partners, developed a sustainable program called *Home Runs for a Greener Rome*. Through this program, the Rome Braves plant a tree for each home run hit at State Mutual Stadium during the season. On September 2, 2009, the Rome Braves baseball players, management and staff along with members from the Rome City Commission, Floyd County Commission, and the City of Rome's Tree Board, collaborated to plant trees along the walking trail behind State Mutual Stadium. Bravo to The Rome Braves for helping to grow and sustain our urban forest.

► **Outstanding New Initiative:**

John W. Atkinson, Gwinnett County Master Gardener, for *To See A Tree is to Know it: Identifying and Visualizing Trees in the Landscape*

John undertook a tree identification project in Gwinnett County's McDaniel Farm Park, which has many outstanding trees on the property, after determining that the public would like to know what these trees are, how large the trees will get, and which of the trees they can find in their own home landscapes. So after getting his project approved by the Gwinnett County Parks & Recreation Department, the Park Manager at McDaniel Farm Park, the Extension office and his instructor of his Master Gardener Advanced Training course, John got to work researching and placing identification signs on trees closest to the trails in the park, for the enjoyment and education of park visitors. John has earned his "Gold Star" status with the University of Georgia's Master Gardener program for his work.

World Series Champion Atlanta Braves stars Ryan Klesko and John Smoltz own 1560 acres of forest in Jones County, Georgia known as "Big K Farm." Forest stewards, they have also turned Big K Farm into a provider of forest education for all ages. Their "Right Field Outdoor Classroom" provides speakers, hands-on activities, and demonstrations on the benefits of trees and forests. Urban visitors such as elementary and high school students, college students, teachers, and legislators have visited Big K Farm to learn about wise land use, forest ecosystems, natural resource management, prescribed burns, invasive species, soil and water conservation, forest and wildlife management, wildfire prevention, and carbon sequestration.

► **2009 President's Award:** Dan Whitehead

Dan Whitehead, Horticulturist and Sales Manager for Moon's Tree Farm and a Past-President of GUFC, was selected this year for the President's Award. Over the years, Dan has sponsored GUFC, the South Carolina Urban and Community Forest Council (now Trees South Carolina), the North Carolina Urban Forest Council, the Georgia Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects, and many other non-profit organizations. Throughout his years as President-Elect, President, and then Past-President of GUFC, Dan showed steady leadership, and since then, has remained very supportive of the organization. His professionalism, generosity, support of urban forestry, and dedication to others make him an outstanding choice for this award. As Dan says, "The best way to succeed is to help someone else succeed."

► **Lifetime Achievement Award:**

Jerry T. Walker, Ph.D.

Jerry T. Walker, Ph.D., began his career as a plant pathologist at the N.Y. Brooklyn Botanical Garden and later became Head of the Department of Plant Pathology at the University of Georgia's Experiment Station in Griffin. In 1975 he became an advisor to the city of Griffin, promoting tree care and planting. In 1989, Dr. Walker and Griffin citizens created Plant the Future, which has planted 4,000 trees in the city. Under Dr. Walker's leadership, Plant the Future was instrumental in Griffin becoming a Tree City USA, a title it has held for over seventeen years now, and Plant the Future received ISA's Gold Leaf Award. He has been an ex-officio member of the City of Griffin Tree Board since its creation. Even though he officially retired in 2000, Professor Emeritus Walker continues his work for Griffin's urban forest.

► **Outstanding Community:**

The Gwinnett County Tree Advisory Committee is responsible for initiating and supporting enhancements to their ordinance such as the required planting of over 15,000 street trees and the 3161 acres preserved in open and green space. Amendments to the Buffer, Landscape & Tree Ordinance, which were proposed by the committee and adopted by the Gwinnett County Board of Commissioners, include preservation of specimen trees, prohibition of tree topping, increased required planting for single family residential subdivisions and lots, increased tree density unit credit for existing trees that will be preserved, and limiting all proposed tree planting to 33% of anyone genus, to name a few.

Across the Savannah River from historic River Street, Bryan Square is located between the Savannah International Trade and Convention Center and the Westin Savannah Harbor Resort. Positioned on top of a parking deck and serving as a roof garden, the Bryan Square waterSmart Demonstration Garden can be enjoyed by visitors, who can learn from its unique design incorporating water-saving techniques. The Garden showcases drought-tolerant plants and efficient irrigation systems, with a visually pleasing coastal theme. In addition, a majestic Live Oak was preserved, and Shoal Creek Chaste Trees, Green Columnar Junipers, and Sabal Palms were planted.

LOCAL ECOSYSTEM AND ECONOMY TO BENEFIT FROM GRANTS

The Georgia Forestry Commission (GFC) will assist in the creation of more than 30 jobs in north Georgia as part of the 2009 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The federal program will subsidize a grant totaling \$897,000 to help stimulate the economy and restore ecosystems impacted by growth and urbanization. The funds will not replace or supplant state mandated GFC budget reductions, but can only be used for job retention or the creation of new, temporary positions in the forestry industry.

“Georgia’s ‘Growing Green’ project will help many north Georgia counties where the highest net changes in employment rates have occurred,” said Susan Reisch, Urban and Community Forestry Coordinator for GFC’s Sustainable Community Forestry Program. “The funding will help create and retain green jobs in nurseries, tool and equipment sales, and landscape architecture, among others. These jobs will help sustain the health and diversity of north Georgia forests, which have been impacted by the pressures of growth and urbanization.”

According to Reisch, funding will be passed to local partner organizations and institutions which provide the mechanism and leverage needed to select tree planting sites and carry out the plantings. Urban forest professionals will guide the strategic placement of trees for economic and environmental benefits such as water and air quality, climate change, energy savings, greenhouse gases reduction, and mitigation of storm runoff.

“On average, Georgia is losing 106 acres of tree canopy per day to urban sprawl,” said Reisch. “This project gives Georgia a unique opportunity to restore trees as part of the infrastructure, which was missing from many original growth plans.”

Designated counties in the approved “Georgia Growing Green” grant include, but are not limited to: Lumpkin, Fannin, Dawson, Union, White, Clarke (Athens), Floyd (Rome), Gordon, Murray, Oglethorpe, Habersham, Morgan, Towns, Rabun, Gordon, Whitfield and Gilmer. These areas have recorded the highest net changes in unemployment rates and are considered to have the strongest potential for building on tree planting capacity.

Funding for this project was provided by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (Recovery Act). The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is working to implement provisions of the Recovery Act to put Americans back to work and rejuvenate the nation’s economy. The Recovery Act provided USDA with nearly \$28 billion in funding; of that, \$1.15 billion has been allocated to the Forest Service for project work in forest restoration, hazardous fuels reduction, construction and maintenance of facilities, trails and roads, green energy projects, and grants to states, tribes, and private landowners.
